
Greenways & Trails Master Plan


Station 1 - Greenways & Trails Master Plan Overview










Station 2 - Existing Conditions - Multimodal Infrastructure



Most trail and bicycle facilities are within County-operated parks and greenspace as well as facilities within Canton and Woodstock. This includes both soft surface and paved trail facilities. There are also some trails within private property near Lake Allatoona, Lake Arrowhead, and the Sutalee Trace Greenspace.




The existing sidewalk network builds upon the trail network - especially within the southern and southwestern portions of Cherokee County. There are many gaps and isolated sidewalks in the more rural eastern and northern sections of the County.








Station 2 - Existing Conditions - Destinations

- 9) Fields Landing Park




Additional destinations that could be connected via trails and greenways include schools, activity centers such as downtown historic districts, commercial shopping centers, and major employment centers. Examples include the Riverstone Parkway corridor in Canton, SR 92 in Woodstock, and the Hickory Flat area.



Station 2 - Existing Conditions - Natural Features



Notable water bodies in Cherokee County include Lake Allatoona, Lake Arrowhead, Hickory Log Creek Reservoir, and the Etowah and Little Rivers. Additionally, there are numerous ponds, streams, and wetlands throughout the County as well as 100- and 500-year floodplains which are important to consider when developing a cohesive trail network.








Station 3 - Proposed Trail Typologies

Overview

This board as well as the one next to it show some preliminary trail types that the project team is considering as it begins to identify potential new trail connections within Cherokee County. These trail typologies were delineated based on an existing conditions facility inventory of trails.

These trail types include both paved surface facilities as well as natural surface trails and features. Each type includes a description and local examples within the County.



Soft Surface Trails

The most prominent trail type within Cherokee County, soft surface trails are usually found within established parks and greenspace. However, not all park trails are soft surface.

Soft surface trails can have different tailored uses but most are utilized for either hiking or equestrian. Typical surfaces are dirt or gravel.

Nearby Examples of Soft Surface Trails

- Garland Mountain
- Sequoyah Park
- Hickory Trails Park
- Range from 5 to 15 feet in width



Mountain Bike Trails

Similar to soft surface trails, mountain bike trails are exclusively for off-road bicycle usage, which is a common recreational activity in Cherokee County and metro Atlanta.

Mountain bike trails are typically soft surface and found in areas that are heavily wooded and with steep terrain.

Regulations vary between trail systems and park locations, but usually, the direction of travel varies by the day of week or time of day.

Nearby Examples of Mountain Bike Trails

- Olde Rope Mill Park
- Blankets Creek
- Sutallee Trace Greenspace (private)
- Reinhardt University
- All are dirt and in good to fair condition




Blueways

Also known as water trails, blueways are navigable waterways, such as rivers, creeks, or streams, for recreational use. Blueways are often utilized for canoeing, tubing, or kayaking, among other activities.

These require kayak launches or access points as well as other amenities which can be connected via paved or soft surface trails.

Nearby Examples of Blueways

- · Etowah River
- Little River
- Existing launch sites include Etowah River Park, Boling Park, Olde Rope Mill Park, Knox Bridge & Fields Landing Park







Station 3 - Proposed Trail Typologies

Greenway Trails

Greenway trails are wide paths (or trails) intended for shared use by people walking, running, biking, skating or using other non-motorized modes of transportation. Greenways are typically not along roadways and travel through parks or along a stream or creek.

These are paved trails (either concrete or asphalt) that have a minimum width of 10 feet. The typical width range is 10 to 14 feet, but they can be wider in areas with higher levels of activity. Centerline stripes may be applied, if desired.

Greenway trails may also include portions with boardwalks in flood prone areas. These facilities should also include lighting, wayfinding, and regulatory signage, where needed.

Nearby Examples of Greenway Trails

- Etowah River Trail in Canton
- Heritage Park in Canton
- Noonday Creek Trail in Woodstock
- Rubes Creek Trail in Woodstock
- Range from 6 to 10 feet in width
- Most in good to excellent condition




Sidepaths (Along Roads)


Sidepaths, like greenways, allow for different types of non-motorized transportation and walking, but are exclusively along public streets. These facilities should provide a buffer to separate vehicles from bicyclists and pedestrians.

While sidepaths can provide trail connections in urban and developing areas, there is the potential for conflicts at intersections and driveways.

Nearby Examples of Sidepaths

- Most are in the Woodstock area such as along Woodstock Parkway, Ridgewalk Parkway, and Town Lake Pass.
- Most have 10-foot widths
- All are concrete and in good to excellent condition

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

















Overview of Existing Conditions





Greenway Trails

- Paved trails (either concrete or asphalt)
- Typically 10 to 14 feet in width
- May also include boardwalks
- Should include lighting and wayfinding and regulatory signage where needed



- Etowah River Trail in Canton
- Heritage Park in Canton
- Noonday Creek Trail in Woodstock
- Rubes Creek Trail in Woodstock
- Range from 6 to 10 feet in width
- Most in good to excellent condition





Sidepaths (along roads)

- Shared-use paths along public streets
- Should provide a buffer to separate vehicles from bicyclists and pedestrians
- Potential for conflicts at intersections and driveways



- Most are in the Woodstock area
 - Woodstock Parkway
 - Ridgewalk Parkway
 - Town Lake Pass
- Most have 10-foot widths
- All are concrete and in good to excellent condition





Blueways

- Navigable waterways for recreational use
 - Canoeing, tubing, or kayaking
- Require access points as well as other amenities
- Also known as water trails



- Etowah River
- Little River
- Existing Launch Sites
 - Etowah River Park
 - Boling Park
 - Olde Rope Mill Park
 - Knox Bridge
 - Fields Landing Park





Soft Surface Trails

- Usually within established parks
 - However, not all park trails are soft surface
- Can have different tailored uses
 - Hiking trails
 - Equestrian trails
- Typical surfaces
 - Dirt
 - Gravel

Mountain Bike Trails

- Trails for off-road bicycle usage
- Typically in steep terrain and wooded areas
- Direction of travel can vary by day of week or time of day







Summary

1. Overview of Activities

- a. Between May 1 and June 30, 2024, Cherokee County and the Greenways & Trails Master Plan project team conducted several meetings and engagement activities designed to gather input and feedback from a wide range of community members.
- b. Activities included three in-person events, one virtual meeting, an online survey, and an interactive mapping exercise. The in-person events included public meetings held at the Cherokee County Woodstock Recreation Center (WREC) on May 9, 2024 and at the County Administration Building on Bluffs Parkway in Caton on May 14, 2024. Additionally, the team attended the Woodstock Farmers' Market on Saturday May 11, 2024 to spread the word about the upcoming meetings and encourage participation in the online survey and interactive mapping activity. A virtual meeting was held on Thursday May 16, 2024 via Zoom. Over 175 people participated in the in-person and virtual meetings. Respondents to the online survey and mapping exercise were 323 and 93, respectively.
- c. The agenda for engagement meetings typically included an overview of the Cherokee County Greenways & Trails Master Plan project, a high-level summary of existing conditions, and introduction to trail typologies, prioritization factors for the trail plan, guiding principles and themes for crafting a vision, gaps and opportunities, and next steps.
- d. Across all meetings and the survey, participants engaged in activities to capture their preferences and priorities for types of trails, guiding principles to shape the vision, and factors to consider when making recommendations for the trail network.





The in-person meetings used interactive boards and a map activity while the virtual meeting used Mentimeter to gather responses and inputs from participants.

2. Key Takeaways and Common Themes

- a. In terms of preferred trail types, most Cherokee community members want more **greenways**. **Soft surface trails** and **sidepaths** are also desired.
- b. The <u>highest priorities</u> for county residents in greenway and trail planning are using trails <u>for</u>
 <u>exercise and recreation</u> and <u>connecting to existing</u>
 trails and sidewalks.
- c. When asked about potential <u>guiding principles</u> for the plan, which will be used to help with identification and prioritization of future projects, participants felt most strongly about improving <u>connectivity</u> and <u>accessibility</u>.
- d. Comments and suggestions by participants focused on the theme of connectivity. Recommendations included creating a countywide greenway that provides eastwest connectivity, connecting schools to greenspaces, and extending existing trails in Cherokee and connecting to trails in neighboring counties.

3. Potential Trail Typologies

a. The engagement meetings and survey described and provided examples of different trail typologies, including greenways, sidepaths (along roads), blueways, soft surface trails, and mountain bike trails. Of all trail types, greenways were the most preferred among participants (Figure 1). Soft surface trails and sidepaths were the second and third most preferred, respectively. The trail type least preferred was mountain bike trails. Cherokee County is well served by mountain bike trails, especially in Woodstock.

4. Priorities for Greenways and Trails


a. Participants were asked to rank seven potential priorities for expanding the county's greenways and trails. The highest ranked priority was greenways and trails as <u>opportunities for exercise and recreation</u> (Figure 2). Following closely behind was to <u>connect to existing trails and sidewalks</u>. The third highest ranked priority was to increase county and regional connectivity. The lowest ranked priority was to increase access to activity centers, job sites, and commercial areas.

5. Principles and Themes for Vision

a. Participants were also asked to rank eight guiding principles that will be used to develop the plan's vision. <u>Improving connectivity and accessibility</u> was the highest ranked principle (Table 1). The second highest ranked principle was to <u>protect and</u> <u>enhance the natural environment</u>. Principles tied for third and fourth were ensuring comfort and safety and fostering sustainability and healthy behavior.

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- b. Participants were asked to identify a few key words that came to mind when thinking about the future of greenways and trails in Cherokee County. Major themes to emerge from this visioning exercise fell along similar lines as the concepts in the guiding principles. Below is a list of themes, in no particular order. These words will be used to help inform the development of an overall vision for Cherokee County's greenways and trails network as part of the planning process.

6. Gaps & Opportunities

a. In addition to the ranking and envisioning activities, some participants provided comments and suggestions to inform the plan's trail and greenway network recommendations. Participants said they are interested in flat biking trails, more soft surface trails, and replicating something like the Alpha Loop in Alpharetta. Comments highlighted a need for trails in the eastern part of the county. The comments also included requests for amenities at trailheads and addressing drainage issues along existing trails.



- b. Connectivity was a common theme across comments. Recommendations included creating a <u>countywide greenway</u> that provides <u>east-west connectivity</u>, <u>connecting schools to greenspaces</u>, <u>extending existing trails</u> in Cherokee and <u>connecting to trails in neighboring counties</u>, and <u>improving access to downtowns</u>. Several participants noted specific locations for developing or connecting trails to one another or other areas, such as a Bells Ferry shared-use path between SR 92 and Sixes Road and connecting Olde Rope Mill Path to Blankets Creek.
- c. While most trail ideas from participants were along public streets, one comment identified the boat ramp near Etowah Mill as an <u>opportunity for a blueway</u> that could connect to the Georgia National Cemetery and Fields Landing Park.





Introduction



Background

Earlier in 2024, Cherokee County began the process of developing the County's first-ever Countywide Greenways & Trails Master Plan. The goal of the plan is to establish a cohesive approach to identifying potential locations for future trails, prioritizing trail connections and allocating funding for new projects with the cities and adjacent counties to develop the network. The master plan will provide a framework and strategy for connecting trail segments, connecting to key places, and providing alternative transportation options.

Community feedback is instrumental to the success of this process, and the project team is working across the County, including with local jurisdictions and community members to develop a prioritized list of projects that align with overall County goals and objectives to create a trail and greenway system that promotes economic development, recreation, and transportation. The **draft trail recommendations** constitute a **proposed network of projects** that will be further studied and refined by Cherokee County during future phases, as resources and priorities allow.

This community open house summarizes the planning process and seeks to gather input on a **draft universe of potential projects**. Using that feedback, our team will prioritize the identified trail projects and finalize the planning process prior to the end of the calendar year.

2) Existing Conditions

The Existing Conditions and Inventory Analyses consisted of reviewing and documenting conditions throughout the County. More than simply identifying where trails exist today, this effort focused on determining the overall context throughout the County to understand where and how the creation of a trail network will be successful. As such, this effort focused on three overall areas.

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Summary

1. Introductions

- a. Bryan Reynolds kicked off the meeting and gave an overview of the Cherokee County Greenways & Trails Master Plan (CCGTP) planning effort and how it is expected to build off of the County's Comprehensive Transportation Plan.
- b. All attendees and the consultant team introduced themselves before the floor was turned over to Eric Lusher, the consultant project manager from Gresham Smith.

2. Presentation

a. Eric gave a presentation which provided an overview of the planning process for the CCGTMP including details and deliverables expected for each of the seven tasks associated with the plan development. The presentation also included expectations and a discussion on the role of the Trail Advisory Committee (TAC).

3. Group Discussion

- a. Eric led a group discussion on goals and principles with focus on the following three questions. Andrew took notes and made observations from the group discussion:
 - i. What are some things that you hope to see out of this planning process?
 - Coordination
 - Collaboration between the County and Cities (Canton, Woodstock, Ball Ground, Holly Springs & Waleska)
 - Defining what partnerships look like
 - Identifying opportunities
 - Connectivity between residential and commercial areas
 - Public support and input
 - The consultant team and County staff should listen to and value input from both stakeholders and the general public



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- ii. What is the role of a trail system in Cherokee County?
 - Connectivity, especially to destinations such as parks, homes, jobs, schools, and businesses
 - Recreation & exercise
 - Economic development
 - a. Bring visitors and people to live/work in Cherokee County
 - Sense of community
 - Bridge diverse demographic groups
 - Improve quality of life
 - Transportation means of commuting
 - Preservation of natural space
 - Educational amenities
 - Social connection
 - Promote walkability
 - Bring attractive quality (i.e. design & aesthetics)
 - Property value enhancement

4. Breakout Groups

- a. Following the group discussion, the group divided themselves across two tables for a map exercise to establish common understanding of existing conditions and future vision. Eric and Andrew led the activity at their tables and focused on the following discussion topics:
 - Establish Existing Conditions
 - What are the major transportation corridors now?
 - What are the key destinations that need to be connected?
 Remind individuals to consider locations and connections outside of the County
 - o Establish an Overall Vision for Trails
 - What are the major connections the trail system should make?
 - What other connections should be made?
 - What connections can be implemented with relative ease?
 - What connections will have challenges to implementation?



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- b. Key themes emerging from both tables include the following:
 - i. Need to make sure the County and consultant team engage with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE); there is property surrounding Lake Allatoona – some of which has soft trails; several meeting attendees were not sure how willing they would be to let the County connect to trails on USACE property
 - ii. Consider incorporating multi-use path in widening project along SR 20 between Cartersville and Canton
 - iii. The Etowah River is seen by many County staff as the best opportunity for a County greenway ("Gold Rush Trails"); this would include trailheads across several parcels already owned by the County that could provide both trail and blueway access
 - iv. Rails-to-trails projects seen as a little more challenging to implement
 - v. There are discussions for a trail connection between downtown Ball Ground and McGraw Ford WMA east of town
 - vi. There is discussion for a mini-trail system parallel to Old SR 5 in Nelson
 - vii. Some trails on and adjacent to the Reinhardt University campus are not shown on the map
 - viii. A connection between Waleska and Garland Mountain and Pine Log in Bartow County is desired but extremely challenging due to topography and available right-of-way
 - ix. Northside Hospital Cherokee should be considered a destination and shown on future maps
 - x. Hickory Road between Holly Springs and Hickory Flat is the site of a sidewalk project; probably not suitable for a recommended sidepath in this effort
 - xi. Be mindful of the update to the Bells Ferry Road LCI that is in discussion amongst County leadership and officials
 - xii. The Little River in Woodstock is a site of a developing kayak trail there may be potential for a trail opportunity to connect Olde Rope Mill to properties east of the softball complex
 - xiii. Trails planning should also account for e-bikes and bikeshare
 - xiv. A connection to the Milton and Alpharetta areas should be considered and/or recommended as part of this effort
 - xv. Water and sewer easements are viewed as an opportunity by CCWSA staff in attendance; the County can work with the consultant team to get GIS data showing location
 - xvi. Portions of I-575 may have potential for a multi-use trail adjacent to the highway similar to PATH 400 in Buckhead that is currently being extended north towards I-285 in Sandy Springs



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- xvii. It may be useful to show programmed or under construction trails across the County (i.e. Noonday Creek Trail between the Cobb County line and SR 92)
- xviii. There are several corridors in the County (i.e. Main Street in Woodstock and Holly Springs) with intermittent sidewalk that is being filled in as development occurs

5. Presentation Part 2 (10 min)

a. Eric closed the presentation by discussing the project's upcoming milestones and by providing contact information for himself and Bryan

6. Action Items

- a. Gresham Smith to coordinate with the County and schedule the next TAC meeting for mid-April as well as location and time for the first round of public open houses (3 meetings) and a pop-up event
- b. Gresham Smith to continue working on the Existing Conditions & Needs Assessment

Sidepaths (along roads)

- Shared-use paths along public streets
- Should provide a buffer to separate vehicles from bicyclists and pedestrians
- Potential for conflicts at intersections and driveways

Blueways





1. Meeting Overview & Project Refresher

- a. Eric Lusher with Gresham Smith began the presentation by providing an overview of the meeting agenda for this TAC meeting and went over some housekeeping items related to signing into Mentimeter. A test question was provided for attendees to sign in with their name and organization.
- b. Eric gave a refresher on the goals, objectives, and schedule for the Cherokee County Greenways & Trails Master Plan (CCGTMP) including details and deliverables expected for each of the seven tasks associated with the plan development.

2. Overview of Existing Conditions

- a. Andrew Smith with Gresham Smith provided an overview of some of the existing conditions findings from the project team. Andrew's presentation included population density, county parks and greenspace, bicycle and trail facilities, pedestrian facilities (sidewalks), activity centers and destinations (including employment destinations and activity centers identified through ARC's Livable Centers Initiative program), elevation, flood hazard areas, and historical and cultural resources.
- b. Andrew opened the floor for questions on existing conditions and there were none from TAC members.

3. Potential Trail Typologies

- a. Lauren Patterson with VHB gave an overview of the proposed trail typologies stemming from the existing trail inventory which the project team compiled. Trail typologies discussed included greenway trails, sidepaths (along roads), blueways, soft surface trails, and mountain bike trails. This discussion served as a baseline for what is to come next in the planning process.
- b. Lauren provided typical characteristics and examples in Cherokee County for each of the five proposed typologies.
- Lauren conducted an interactive polling question to gain an understanding of which trail typologies TAC members would like to see more of in Cherokee County.
 Greenways and soft surface trails finished first and second, respectively.



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4. Developing a Vision


- a. Erin Thoresen with Gresham Smith presented on the elements for a trail vision with Cherokee County. She began with a recap of the trail system role elements identified during the first TAC meeting in early March, such as connectivity to destinations, preservation of natural space, and promoting walkability, among other items.
- b. Erin went over the eight guiding principles the project team developed based on input from the first TAC meeting. These include the following:
 - i. Improve connectivity and accessibility
 - ii. Ensure comfort and safety
 - iii. Support economic development
 - iv. Protect and enhance the natural environment
 - v. Foster sustainability and healthy behavior
 - vi. Increase awareness of trails/greenways

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- vii. Maintain a state of good repair
- viii. Promote arts and culture
- c. TAC members were asked to rank each of the eight guiding principles in Mentimeter. The most important guiding principle was improving connectivity and accessibility followed by supporting economic development and fostering sustainability and healthy behavior.



- d. Misti Martin mentioned that trails and connectivity can be a way to show residents that they can live cohesively next to businesses, and particularly like the corporate park at Cherokee 75. Misti also thought the Etowah River Park is another good example with it being next to the Canton Cherokee Park, but so many times if there is a residential neighborhood when there are rezonings, they want to ensure there is not an industrial type of use next to them. Lastly, Misti talked about the return on investment and trails being a potential amenity for helping recruit companies and organizations to place operations within Cherokee County.
- e. Erin said these are all excellent points and cited Vandelande in the Town Center are of Cobb County as a nearby example. They chose to locate there partly due to the nearby Noonday Creek Trail.



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
- f. Erin continued by guiding a discussion for crafting a vision statement including articulating long-term aspirations, inspiring others, and guiding planning and decision making. Erin included example vision statements from Bella Vista, AR and Prince George's County, VA to help foster input from TAC members.
- g. Erin presented a draft vision statement for Cherokee County Trails as follows:

"A sustainable, vibrant system of greenways and trails provides all residents and visitors with access to nature, recreation, history, and culture, Cherokee County's greenways and trails also support the local economy, promote sustainability, community health, and human connection."

- i. Most TAC members responded positively to this vision statement, but there was discussion of whether it should be peaceful or vibrant as based on a comment from Chris Luly. Misti Martin thought the statement should use the word "sustainable" only once (the vision also uses sustainability). Catherine liked the word "vibrant" and thought it reflected a desire for better placemaking
- ii. Erin said this was all valuable feedback and that the project team will reexamine based on these comments and others anticipated during the first round of public open houses.
- h. Erin concluded by conducting an interactive polling question asking TAC members to identify two to three words that help them envision the future of trails and greenways in Cherokee County. Notable words TAC members responded with include "recreational," "connectivity," "convenient," and "accessible."



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- i. Brantley Day asked the TAC not to overlook the transportation alternatives aspect of the trails and greenways effort. This could potentially be a way for people to reach jobs and other destinations.
- j. Brian Borden likened the Greenprints Trails system in Woodstock to being something with a weaving fabric like a Spaghetti Junction for trails, especially near the downtown area.


5. Gaps & Opportunities

- Eric began the next portion of the meeting by providing a recap of the mapping exercise from the first TAC meeting and the opportunities identified for establishing trail and greenway connections across Cherokee County.
- b. Eric then went through several example prioritization framework for identifying suitable locations and prioritizing future projects and listed potential factors and considerations for the CCGTMP prioritization process.
- c. TAC members were asked to choose two to three prioritization factors in Mentimeter that they perceived were most important to developing a greenway and trail network in Cherokee County. The two most important prioritization factors



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which emerged from this exercise were filling existing gaps and county and regional connectivity. These were followed by community support and increasing access to essential services.



d. Samantha Henry and Pam Carnes asked the project team to send access to Mentimeter after the meeting since they were in transit during the call. The screenshots in this summary include their feedback.

6. Next Steps & Action Items

- a. Gresham Smith to continue finalizing analyses related to the Existing Conditions & Needs Assessment task.
- b. Gresham Smith to conduct the first round of public open houses in mid-May:
 - i. May 9, 2024 Woodstock Recreation Center 6:30-8:30pm
 - ii. May 14, 2024 County Administration Building 6:30-8:30pm
 - iii. May 16, 2024 Virtual Option 6:30-7:30pm

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- c. Gresham Smith to coordinate with the Woodstock Farmers' Market to conduct a pop-up event at the May 11th Farmers' Market. Gresham Smith to also reach out to the City of Canton to identify a pop-up event opportunity for that portion of the County.
- d. Gresham Smith will be reaching out to TAC members and other stakeholders to conduct stakeholder interviews after the first round of public open houses concludes.
- e. Gresham Smith to coordinate with the County and schedule the next TAC meeting for the week of July 22nd based on feedback from multiple TAC members and not to conclude with the beginning of school for Cherokee County Schools on August 1st. The meeting will be in-person and serve as a discussion for drafting the trail network. Gresham Smith will communicate final plans with TAC members as details are finalized.
